PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



VALERIE C. MOORE, M.D. CLEAN AIR ACT The Clean Air Act has passed! I feel

like it is a dream come true. It seems like such a simple thing to be able to go to public places and not be exposed to smoke. In order to get something like this passed it took a lot of work, pas-sion and politics. For the past two years the bill has passed both houses of the legislature, but has not been signed into law.

Since the state government would not prohibit smoking, I felt that the local school district should be able to do something about tobacco in the schools. As chairman of the Health Advisory Committee for Lee County Schools I brought up the idea at a meeting last year. The idea of prohibit-ing tobacco in the schools was met ing tobacco in the schools was met with great enthusiasm by the commit-tee, all dedicated to better health of the students, faculty and staff. The school board and Dr. Adams were approached with the idea of tobacco free schools. While they agreed with the committee, they said their hands were tied by contracts with the unions that allowed for a smoking area to be provided in the schools.

Even though the Clean Air Act was in

the works, a task force led by Betty Harmon, director of Health Education, began work on a package of informa-tion to bring change to the schools. If the Clean Air Act had not passed, they were ready to do the job here in the Lee County Schools.

Since this change was so difficult to bring about you might think we are in the forefront of this movement. Not so, as 42 other states have already passed this type of law. The tobacco lobby must be stronger in this state

A questionaire was sent to students A questionaire was sent to students and employees of Lee County Schools by the task force. Both students (72%) and employees (75%) felt that they should not have to be exposed to smoke in their environment. The other figure that surprised me was that the percentage of smokers in the employees group was so small, 17%. The percentage of smokers of the students was

OVERVIEW OF THE DPR DISCIPLINARY PROCESS

The following information is a brief overview of the disciplinary process and is not

intended to be interpreted as a complete analysis.

The Department of Professional Regulation is directed by the Florida Legislature to investigate any complaint which is filed if the complaint is legally sufficient. Legal sufficiency is the articulation of enough ultimate facts to demonstrate a violation of

sufficiency is the articulation of enough ultimate facts to demonstrate a violation of applicable laws and rules.

Gathering the facts: Information about possible violations of the statutes and rules governing licensed professionals may be received by the department from many sources, such as patients, other licensees and the drug diversion and inspection programs. These reports or complaints are evaluated by analysts in the department to determine if there are grounds for further investigation.

If the initial information is sufficient to require more fact gathering the licensee involved will be positively and paratment that an investigation will be conducted.

DPR FOR POLITICIANS

The Department of Professional Regulation (DPR) has been empowered to license and regulate most professional activities in this state. This bureacratic nightmare has taken up the regulatory challenge with vehemence, and it appears that only two endeavors breeding and politics are endeavors, breeding and politics, are exempted from their scrutiny. We are unlikely to dare to venture into the re-productive habits of Floridians, but we

productive habits of Floridians, but we should give serious thought to licensing and regulating politicians.

To implement this program we must first define a politician. My suggestion is that we include all candidates for public office, and all appointees to boards that spend public money. I would include under DPR authority all carpetbaggers like candidates in the federal primary elections, presidential federal primary elections, presidential candidates in November and federal commission appointees within the

Most professions have minimum standards to be met by candidates for licensure. If we are to make politicians licensure. If we are to make politicians professionals, we must first establish those qualities we demand in our political leaders and candidates. While democratically elected officials by definition should be of diverse backgrounds, we certainly can agree on a few requirements to obtain and hold a state political license. Educational background cannot be criteria as many of the brightest, most practical and most productive individuals in society have little formal education and secondly, most present politicians are attorneys. Nonetheless we sould be able torneys. Nonetheless we sould be able to agree on three points.

Intelligence can be measured in many ways, IQ being one of the most popular and standardized. Tests can even be administered to the handicapped. I think we must expect a minimum standard greater than dull

normal. Because we have never had a minimum standard, the expression "political flunky" grew up representing a dull normal politician easily manipulated by back-roomers and "developers". Institution of this minimum standard would be enough to decimate our incumbent county crowd.

A knowledge of ethics is my second requirement. Candidates would be required to attend courses on ethical behavior in politics, and be examined prior to the granting of their licenses. This approach has served well in real estate sales ing where the candidate must present a course attendance certificate before sitting the examination. Passing the test provides written proof the candidate as cognizant of what constitutes ethical behavior and that breeches will not be tolerated. This will clean out most of our surviving local politicians and should make great reading in the DPR Newsletter.

Finally, we need a certification of honesty and require a bond be posted. Again, like the ethics requirement, the candidate will need to demonstrate a knowledge of

like the ethics requirement, the candidate will need to demonstrate a knowledge of what constitutes honesty on written examination. Failure to comply after the issuing of a license would mean forfeiture of both license and bond.

As I see it, my system has advantages for both the state and the politicians. Foremost, the state will gain a significant source of revenue. Unquestionably the license fee should be equal to or greater than that for physicians after submitting an application processing fee comparable to that required for medical licensing. Additionally, bond forfeiture undoubtedly will be an important source of revenue for a while until we weed out the bad eggs. In a wink the Governor can suggest mandatory surtaxes on political license fees as they have done to physicians. These would be similar to the Birth Injuries thing and the proposed Medicaid support fee. Suggestions for funds supported by politicians in this category would include the Brain Dead Politicians Related Injury Reimbursement Fund to repay members of the public for losses due to misconduct by those only-too-happy to participate politicians and their uninvolved colleagues.

Ultimately, those surviving politicians may actually be capable of restoring some Oltimately, those surviving politicians may actually be capable or restoring some public confidence in our governmental system in Florida. By implementing this licensure and regulation we may actually see a politician becoming something more than a world that conjures up the same sensation as sneezing in your hand when a handkerchief is not available.

OVERVIEW (continued from page 1) The investigator may request further information and documents about the alleged incident or conduct interviews with the professional and others involved. The investigative report and all other documentation will then be pre-

sented to the Probable Cause Panel of the professional board.

Full and fair due process: If the Full and fair due process: If the panel finds probable cause to believe a violation has been committed, an administrative complaint will be issued to the subject of the investigation detailing the allegations and asking for an election of rights. In an election of rights, the licensee may agree to a stipulated settlement, an informal hearing, or an adversarial hearing before a state-appointed hearing officer.

In all cases, the board alone will determine the final disposition of a case and the disciplinary action to be imposed on a practitioner, if any. After receiving the final order, the disciplined licensee may appeal the case to district court.

All aspects of filing and investigating All aspects of filing and investigating complaints and of prosecuting and imposing disciplinary actions are strictly governed by statute and rule, and the involved practicioner may expect full and fair due process throughout the entire procedure. CITATION AUTHORITY RULES

Information on the rule 21M-20.017 referred to as "Citation Authority". The rule sets forth the procedure for the issuance of citations, as well as the violations and the enalty for each violation. Authorization for the Board's action comes from Section 453.224, Florida Statutes. Section 453.224 allows the Board by rule to set form section 453.224 allows the Board by rule to set form section 453.224 allows the Board by rule to set form section and penalties for which the Department of Professional Regulations may issue a citation and, if the licensee accepts the citation, the investigation, the investigative and disciplinary pro-

censee accepts the citation, the investigation, the investigative and disciplinary process may be shortened.

The citations and penalties are for violations in which there is no "substantial" or "potential" threat to the "public health, safety, and welfare". In addition to the penalty imposed the Respondent may be required to pay the costs of investigation.

The rule lists the following violations and the amounts of the penalties that may be disposed of by citation: CME Violations (Sections 458.321, 458.331(1)(X)): 1. Failure to document required HIV/AIDS CME - \$500. 2. Failure to document required risk management CME - \$1000. 3. Failure to document required HIV/AIDS and risk management - \$1500. 4. Documentation of some, but not all, 40 hours of required CME for license renewal - \$50.00 for each hour not documented.

Obtaining License Renewal by Fraud or Misrepresentation (Section 458.331(1)(a)); failure to document any of the 40 hours required CME for license renewal (Section 458.331, 458.331(1)(x) - \$5,000 written reprimand.

Practice on an inactive license (Sections 458.327(1)(a), 458.331(1)(x)) 1. For a period of nine months - Letter of Guidance; 2. For a period of nine months to twelve months - \$100 for each month or part.

months - \$100 for each month or part.
Failure to notify department of change of practice address (Sections 458.319(5),

458.331(1)(g)) - \$250.

458.331(1)(g)) - \$250.

Failure to provide medical records of only one patient (Section 455.241,455.331(1)(g)) - \$100.

Failure to post notice on the form of a sign informing patients that the physician does not have malpractice coverage (Sections 458.320 (1) 458.320 (5)(f) and (g), 458.331 (1)(x)) - \$1000.

These penalties apply ONLY for an initial offense. Subsequent violation(s) of the same rule or statute require Section 455.225, Florida Statute, to be followed. Also should an initial offense for which a citation could be issued occur in conjunction with other violations, then Section 455.225 is followed. ■

Signs must be posted notifying employees regarding the Federal Minimum Wage Laws, the Employee Polygraph Protection Act, Equal Employment Opportunity Laws, and Job Safety and Health Protection provisions. Some commercial businesses will supply these notices in a convenient form. Otherwise, you may obtain them as follows:
